introduction to nordic cultures is an innovative interdisciplinary introduction to nordic history cultures and societies from medieval times to today the textbook spans the whole nordic region covering historical periods from the viking age to modern society and engages with a range of subjects from runic inscriptions on iron rings and stone monuments via eighteenth century scientists ibsen s dramas and turn of the century travel to twentieth century health films and the welfare state nature ideology greenlandic literature nordic noir migration new scandinavians and stereotypes of the nordic the chapters provide fundamental knowledge and insights into the history and structures of nordic societies while constructing critical analyses around specific case studies that help build an informed picture of how societies grow and of the interplay between history politics culture geography and people introduction to nordic cultures is a tool for understanding issues related to the nordic region as a whole offering the reader engaging and stimulating ways of discovering a variety of cultural expressions historical developments and local preoccupations the textbook is a valuable resource for undergraduate students of scandinavian and nordic studies as well as students of european history culture literature and linguistics

slang across societies is an introductory reference work and textbook which aims to acquaint readers with key themes in the study of youth criminal and colloquial language practices focusing on key questions such as speaker identity and motivations perceptions of use and users language variation and attendant linguistic manipulations the book identifies and discusses more than 20 in group and colloquial varieties from no fewer than 16 different societies worldwide suitable for advanced undergraduate and postgraduate students working in areas of slang lexicology lexicography sociolinguistics and youth studies slang across societies brings together extensive research on youth criminal

and colloquial language from different parts of the world

exploring russian as a pluricentric language this book provides a panoramic view of its use within and outside the nation and discusses the connections between language politics ideologies and cultural contacts russian is widely used across the former soviet republics and in the diaspora but speakers outside russia deviate from the metropolis in their use of the language and their attitudes towards it using country case studies from across the former soviet union and beyond the contributors analyze the unifying role of the russian language for developing transnational connections and show its value in the knowledge economy they demonstrate that centrifugal developments of russian and its pluricentricity are grounded in the language and education policies of their host countries as well as the goals and functions of cultural institutions such as schools media travel agencies and others created by émigrés for their co ethnics this book also reveals the tensions between russia s attempts to homogenize the russian world and the divergence of regional versions of russian reflecting cultural hybridity of the diaspora interdisciplinary in its approach this book will prove useful to researchers of russian and post soviet politics russian studies russian language and culture linguistics and immigration studies those studying multilingualism and heritage language teaching may also find it interesting

the routledge handbook of language contact provides an overview of the state of the art of current research in contact linguistics presenting contact linguistics as an established field of investigation in its own right and featuring 26 chapters this handbook brings together a broad range of approaches to contact linguistics including experimental and observational approaches and formal theories a focus on social and cognitive factors that impact the outcome of language contact situations and bilingual language processing the emergence of new languages and speech varieties in contact situations and contact linguistic phenomena in urban speech and linguistic landscapes with contributions from an international range of leading and emerging scholars in their fields the four sections of this text deal with methodological and theoretical approaches the factors that condition and shape language contact the impact of language contact on individuals and language change repertoires and formation this handbook is an essential reference for anyone with an interest in language contact in particular regions of the world including anatolia eastern polynesia the balkans asia melanesia north america and west africa

this volume deals with several types of contact languages pidgins creoles mixed languages and multi ethnolects it also approaches contact languages from two perspectives an historical linguistic perspective more specifically from a viewpoint of genealogical linguistics language descent and linguistic family tree models and a sociolinguistic perspective identifying specific social contexts in which contact languages emerge

making european muslims provides an in depth examination of what it means to be a young muslim in europe today where the assumptions

values and behavior of the family and those of the majority society do not always coincide focusing on the religious socialization of muslim children at home in semi private islamic spaces such as mosques and quran schools and in public schools the original contributions to this volume focus largely on countries in northern europe with a special emphasis on the nordic region primarily denmark case studies demonstrate the ways that family life public education and government policy intersect in the lives of young muslims and inform their developing religious beliefs and practices mark sedgwick s introduction provides a framework for theorizing muslimness in the european context arguing that muslim children must navigate different and sometimes contradictory expectations and demands on their way to negotiating a european muslim identity
